CONSTRUCTION OF NORWICH TOWNSHIP JOINT SAFETY SERVICES BUILDING UNDER WAY

The ground breaking ceremony for the new Norwich Township Joint Safety Services Building was held October 10 at 4164 Avery Rd. It was attended by the Norwich Township Board of Trustees, as well as members of the Norwich Township Fire Department, Hilliard Police Department, and Hilliard City Council. Norwich Township Fire Station 81 is currently being remodeled with a major addition being added.

This new joint safety services building, designed by the architectural firm Meacham & Apel, is the first of its kind in Ohio. The new building will be a 63,527 square foot facility with 24,142 square feet being occupied by the Norwich Township Fire



Department, 29,265 square feet being occupied by the Hilliard Police Department and 10,120 square feet being shared space between the two. The total cost for this new facility will be \$9,434,725, of which Norwich Township will be using existing funds to cover this expense. The City of Hilliard will make lease payments to Norwich Township for the next 30 years to cover their portion

of the building cost.

Altman Construction is the General Contractor for this project. Bids for the other services were awarded as follows:

- Electric – Converse Electric
- HVAC – TP Mechanical
- Plumbing – Radico, Inc.
- Fire Protection – Dalmatian Fire, Inc.

The estimated completion date for this project is December, 2008. In the meantime, fire personnel from Station 81 will be relocated to a temporary building at 3760 Municipal Way, near the Hilliard Police Department. Also, all of the Township and Fire Administrative Offices have been moved to Norwich Township Fire Station 83 at 4283 Davidson Road.





Where Do Your Tree Leaves Go?

Storm water comes from rain and melting snow that does not soak into the ground. It flows over rooftops, paved areas, and sloped lawns to storm drains in our streets and then flows to our streams, creeks, and rivers. Pollutants from the streets and gardens are carried in storm water. Though we may not think about it too often, or not at all, how we care for our lawns and yards directly affects our streams and rivers, which also affects our drinking water. Whether we live near or far from a river, eventually our storm water will end in a river. Simple solutions for lawn care can improve water quality and habitat quality in our waterways. We can *easily* contribute to enhancing our rivers.

Leaves and grass clippings left on sidewalks, driveways, alleys and streets are washed into storm drains where they decay. This decaying plant material releases bacteria, oxygen-consuming materials, nitrogen, and phosphorus into our waterways. These nutrients throw off the fragile balance of plant and animal life in rivers. Leaves and grass clippings may also accumulate and obstruct storm drains, causing them to function improperly or even flood. Small steps to protect our waterways from these pollutants include:

- Leave grass clippings on the lawn
- Use lawn bags to dispose of yard waste
- Compost grass clippings and leaves in the backyard; some communities have composting centers available
- Sweep up or recycle clippings that are on sidewalks, driveways, and alleys

- Throw out baked goods that are homemade, unless you know the origin.

Is Norwich Township Receiving your BMV License Tax?

What do 99 percent of you reading this article have in common? You drive a vehicle. In order to drive in Ohio, you must pay an annual vehicle license fee. A portion of the license plate tax that residents of the unincorporated areas of Norwich Township pay is returned to the township for use in road repairs and maintenance.

To ensure that your tax dollars get paid to Norwich Township, please take a moment to verify with the BMV that Norwich Township is listed on your vehicle registration prior to renewal. If you renew your license plates by mail or via a third party, such as a leasing company, please verify that Norwich Township is designated as the recipient of the tax dollars. If you do not specifically designate Norwich Township as the area where you live, the tax money will go to your mailing address, which in most cases, is the City of Hilliard.

One other important reminder for those residents who reside in the unincorporated areas of Norwich Township, upon registering a new vehicle or renewing an existing vehicle registration, you must specifically designate that you reside in Norwich Township only, not the City of Hilliard. By doing so, you will pay the correct registration fee which is approximately \$5 less per vehicle than the registration fee for City of Hilliard-Norwich Township residents.

OCTOBER IS FIRE PREVENTION MONTH

During the month of October, Norwich Township Firefighters will be teaching fire prevention to area elementary school students. Most Fire Departments provide Fire Prevention education to school age students. The Norwich Township Fire Department has always made fire prevention a high priority in the community. Kindergarten-aged students from each school in the Hilliard school district have the opportunity to visit the Fire Station and have a tour of the station, as well as a talk by firefighters about fire safety. During this visit, one firefighter will put on his fire gear so the students can learn not to be afraid of him. Firefighters then visit first through fifth grade students at each elementary school and give fire safety talks.



The visit to the third graders is the highlight for many students because they get to ride to the top of the ladder with a firefighter. Many of the talks given to the older students revolve around making sure that smoke detectors are in working order and that students help their families with escape plans in case

of fire. After elementary school, education continues with informational booklets handed out to sixth through eighth graders.
